



Title Page: Story Introduction

Page 2

Narrative – Orientation

Establish time, purpose and character.

Language Features

Question text: Is it a good day to play

with the ball?

Rhyming words: day, play

Comprehension: Connection, Questioning

If you were the author how would you write that question? What do you like to play outside? Why?

English, Maths and Arts Activity

Discuss various ball activities – from small balls (tennis) to large balls (inflatable beach balls). Draw the balls in order of size and write a label.



Pages 4 and 5

Narrative – Event and Complication

The boy asks if it's a good day for the beach?

Language Features

Question and answer format: supports pp. 2–3. Thought bubble: discuss its purpose Words starting with "b": bad, beach ("ball" on pages 2 and 3.

Comprehension: Visual, Connection

Imagine if you were thinking about going to the beach too. What is good weather for going to the beach? Why?

English, Arts, Health and Safety Activity

Discuss the appropriate clothing for beach activities and protection from the sun. Draw themselves at the beach swimming or playing between the flags. Add a thought bubble too.

Teaching Unit

Good Day Bad Day Level 1 Fiction – Narrative

Curriculum Topics: English; Earth and Space


Sciences (weather). **Book Synopsis:** A boy looks at the weather to see whether it is a good day to play ball or go to the beach. He ends up reading a book.

Non-High Frequency Words: All words are decodable and most are one-syllable.

High Frequency Words: Most words are repeated on each page.

Comprehension: The Teaching Unit's focus is on seven areas of comprehension – connection, inference, importance, questioning, summarising, synthesis and visual. We advise teachers to tailor literal comprehension questions for each group.





Page 3

Narrative – Complication

The boy discovers that the weather is too windy to play ball outside.

Language Features

Words starting with "b": bad, ball

Answer text: No, it is a bad day to play with the ball.


Comprehension: Importance, Inference

Why is the weather important to the boy? What might happen if he played ball in the wind?

English, Science and Arts Activity

Role play what you would do when opening the door to a blustery wind. What would you say?







Pages 6 and 7

Narrative – Event and Resolution

The boy thinks about an alternative activity for this bad-weather day.

Language Features

Antonyms: yes ("no" on pp. 3, 5)
Words starting with "b": book ("bad" on pp. 3, 5; "ball" on pp. 2–3; "beach" on pp. 4–5)

Comprehension: Synthesize

Do you agree with the boy's decision to read a book instead? Why?

English and Arts Activity

Describe a favourite book you have read. Why did you enjoy it? Design a cover for your book.

I love this ending because there really is nothing better than curling up with a book!



Page 8

Narrative – Coda

The boy works out that every day is a good to read a book.

Language Features

"Day" phrases: "good day" on pp. 2, 4, 6-8; "bad day" on pp. 3, 5; "every day" on p. 8

Vowel blend "ea": read ("beach" on pp. 4-5)

Comprehension: Summarise

What is another ending that the author could have written for this story?

English and Arts Activity

Look at the cover of this book. Design a different cover.

Chart: Good and Bad Weather Fun


Divide a chart into two columns — one for good-weather icons and one for bad-weather icons. Draw and label activities that suit each weather condition.
